Bermuda Grass Experiment on Danube Drive

In the latter part of August a crew from 3 Season's Lawn and Landscape dug up some lawn in front of Building #9 and laid down some Bermuda grass sod. This limited area was chosen for two reasons. First was that we wanted a contiguous area to be able to follow the area over the next year or so. And, secondly, we wanted a front area that needed attention and was on a single watering zone.

The Bermuda grass will generally survive serious drought conditions. It tends to go dormant and brown over when not getting enough water, but then bounces back to life when the water returns.

We will keep an eye on how it grows, its appearance during drought and deluge, weed resistance, etc. Feedback from Village Woods residents is welcome during 2012.
